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What Is A Mother?


It takes a Mother's Love to make a house a home, A place to be remembered, no matter where we roam.

Text Scriptures: Exodus 1:15 - 2:10; Acts 7:17-22; Hebrews 11:23

"The Lord gives good many things twice over; but he don't give ye a mother but once." Spoken by the character Tom in Harriet Beecher Stowe's *Uncle Tom's Cabin.* May is once again here and, of course, in the month of May we set one day aside as Mother's Day. A day set apart to annually take a moment to contemplate and appreciate motherhood. A job that is often thankless and always difficult. No one has ever said that being a mother or parent is easy. We can find evidence of this from our scripture text in Exodus.

Being a parent often means having to make difficult choices and decisions. Consider the mother of Moses and the difficult choice that she had to make. The Hebrew people were slaves in Egypt. Despite their captivity they were blessed by God and were fruitful and multiplied. This alarmed the Egyptians who were concerned that if the Hebrews continued to grow in numbers, they might grow strong enough to rise up in rebellion. Because of this, the king of Egypt decreed that every male Hebrew child that was born should be killed.

This is certainly a heart-wrenching story, but to really appreciate its gravity, you have to interject yourself into it. Imagine that the same order were given today. All male Christian-born children were to be killed. Imagine the agony, apprehension, and turmoil you would feel while

expecting a child and knowing that if the child is born a male, he will be killed!

This is the condition in which Moses was born to his mother. The baby Moses was born "a goodly child" and his mother "hid him three months" (Exodus 2:2). Imagine what this family must have endured these three months, living in constant fear that he might cry out and be discovered. How they must have pampered him. They had to have always been ready to cover his mouth to muffle his cries, knowing that at any minute someone could pass by and discover their secret!

Parents were forced to abandon their sons rather than have them taken by force (Acts 7:19). Hoping that someone might find them and take pity on them. And so Moses' mother had to make the difficult decision to abandon her own child. Not because she did not love him deeply, but quite the opposite, she loved him and knew that the only chance he had at life was for her to give him up. This decision had to break her heart, but she had no choice. And so, when it was impossible for her to hide him any longer she secured a basket and plastered it so it would not leak. Then she gently placed the boy inside and put the basket on the bank of the river. It was a difficult decision to make, but one she was forced to make.

Parents still are making difficult decisions about and for their children. It has always been that way and always will; it's part of being a parent. Parents are often called upon to make tough decisions regarding discipline, medical needs, education, associations, relationships, etc. The decisions for a child's spiritual well-being and their walk with God can be some of the most difficult because they often are complete opposite of the natural man within each of us and the world and people surrounding us.

Being a parent also requires wisdom and discernment. Moses' mother didn't just abandon him, she demonstrated wisdom and forethought. She left Moses' sister, Miriam, nearby to see what would become of him. The implication is that she had left instructions with Miriam about what to do if certain things occurred. So, when Pharaoh's daughter found the basket with baby Moses inside, Miriam asked if she should go find a Hebrew nursemaid to care for the child. Miriam then returned with her own and Moses' mother. She then had to demonstrate remarkable restraint and calmly agree to care for the child and even accept wages for the task.

Today's parents also need wisdom and discernment. When to say yes and when to say no. When to intervene and when to step back and let them work it out. When to grant more freedom and when to tighten the restrictions. When to rejoice over a new relationship or friendship or when to bring it to a halt. To know when your child is being truthful or when they are being deceptive, and to have the answers to life that children need.

The above would be all but impossible of our own ability if we did not have God to trust in to help us accomplish it. The mother of Moses had to trust in God to do what she did. Moses was born with a destiny that God was aware of, but his mother was not. Moses would lead God's people out of Egyptian bondage and be the greatest lawgiver the world has ever known. To accomplish this, it was necessary that Moses grow up in Pharaoh's palace, where he could be educated and made ready for the great tasks that lay before him (Acts 7:22). The mother of Moses had to have been a woman of great faith to entrust her son in God's care although it went against every natural desire of a mother for her child (Hebrews 11:23).

There comes a time when all parents have to trust their children into God's care. As much as you would like to, you cannot always go with your children into the world. In her diary, Anne Frank wrote, "Parents can only give good advise or put them [their children] on the right paths, but the final formation of a person's character lies in their own hands." There is certainly truth in this statement, but as Christians we can go farther and believe that our

children's futures are also in God's hands. But God's future for them may be different than yours.

As Christian parents you are quite familiar with praying for your children and entrusting them to God's care and safekeeping. You pray to keep them safe from danger or harm, to guard them from evil and trouble. When our children are presented before God for a blessing, we are asking him to work in their lives. God realizes that in the lives of children as well as in the lives of adults and parents, some hardship, trial, adversity and pain is necessary for growth and strength.

Yes, being a parent is no easy thing. But it is a joyous experience, the most rewarding experience life has to offer. For you see, in being parents you have the possibility, the potential, and the opportunity to raise a soul unto the Lord and to glorify the name of God. Think how different the world would have been if Moses' mother had not trusted her child to God and instead held onto him only to be discovered and killed!

Being a parent means making difficult choices. It always requires wisdom, discernment and the ability to trust them to the goodness and care of God.



Paul tells the young man, Timothy, "For bodily exercise profiteth little: but godliness is profitable unto all things, having promise of the life that now is, and of that which is to come." Today I can find more people in my gym than in my church. Not only are they in the gyms to build a younger firmer body, they are getting lypo-suction face lifts, coloring or plugging their bald heads with hair and coloring their gray, in an attempt to maintain youth.

Gray hair was honored in Israel (Prov. 20, "The glory of young men is their strength: and the beauty of old men is the gray head.").
